Visual communication design is the art of visual communication through the use of images, words, and ideas to disseminate information, to activate brands and to solve visual communication design problems. Graphic design can be used for advertising, or just for entertainment intended for the mind.

This course encompasses key design elements and principles. Design elements include line, shape, form and texture, and design principles cover composition, balance, contrast and focal point.
